SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING

Dear Members.

Those of you who attended the BASUG AGM in June, 1981, will remember the discussion of the intention to form a limited company to handle the business side of BASUG affairs. An enabling clause was inserted into the Constitution to this effect. The actual creation of this body was deferred to a Special General Meeting to be held in November, 1981. That time is now approaching fast and the meeting has been set for Sunday, November 22 at 2.45 p.m.

Let me give a little resume for the benefit of members who are unaware of the pressures for this move.

There are certain technical reasons, (for example, that as our merchandising operations grow in volume, they are taking us inexorably nearer toward the VAT threshold, and we would not want BASU6 membership fees to be liable to tax...), but the overriding consideration is one of pressure of BASU6 business on the committee's members' time.

So far we have succeeded quite well, we believe, in our stumblebum methods, but as our membership nears the 1000 mark, our administration is beginning to crack apart at the seams. One of the things this means in practical terms is that processing new memberships is taking longer and longer. Try to imagine that someone, and that someone is usually BASUG secretary John Sharp, has to make it part of his life's routine to go every day to clear our P.O. Box Number in Matford. Then he has to read - or at least open - some twenty to thirty letters a day, before sorting them and getting them in some kind of organized form. Some he answers himself, some he passes on to others for action - say to the membership secretary who with his own hands makes up your starter packs of magazines and disks, maintains the database, or to the software librarian who in turn has to fill orders and keep the library in shape, etc, etc. The editor has to set aside - what shall we say, twenty hours a week? - for getting Hard Core to you. We meet at least once a week apart from attending regular meetings. Next year we have some major events planned, of which you will be hearing later.

This is not a complaint but simply a reminder - rather understated - that it cannot continue like this. Just in case you imagined otherwise, we are all unpaid volunteers, and although we like running a club, it is seriously interfering with what we like doing more, namely programming with our Apples.

For this reason we would like you to approve our plan to set up a separate organization to handle some of BASUG's affairs.

The organization, (suggested title "BASUS Ltd"), would for instance: produce Hard Core on behalf of BASUS (which would continue as you know it) take over merchandising activities for the benefit of members (sale of disks, tee shirts, certain hardware items, etc), make payments for secretarial or other help needed to administer the club. A resolution will be put to the General Meeting which would direct the committee to take the first formal steps towards

establishing this company. This will involve consulting solicitors, accountants, bankers etc to work out the formal structure of the company. When this has been done a further General Meeting will be called to approve all of the necessary documentation. In the meantime any points on how the company would be run would be welcome.

Another related but separate proposal to be discussed and voted upon at the SGM is for the annual subscription for 1982. The proposal is that subscription for new members to be raised to £12.50. Renewal membership for present members is to remain at £10.00. The difference reflects the fact that new members receive an introductory disk of programs - old members don't.

At this point we have to mention the method of levying subscriptions. What happens to applicants who send in their cheque for £10.00 in late November or December? It was decided from the first that membership is by calendar year, but this does not prevent a latecomer feeling aggrieved. We can only say that the benefits of membership are genuinely retroactive in the sense that they include receipt of one year's issues of Hard Core, access to the Software Libraries — either of which alone could justify the membership. You only need to receive the one routine you desperately need, or one piece of valuable advice for it to pay off.

Nevertheless, for members joining after 1 October, because they have had no opportunity of enjoying the benefits of membership throughout the year, we are offering a reduced membership of £6.00 which does not include all the back issues of Hard Core. (There is no method of getting this message to all the Apple owners out there somewhere, prospective members not yet on our mailing list, to prevent them sending off the full amount). To repeat, maintaining a rolling membership is quite beyond our present capabilities.

May we urge you to think about this and vote on the proposals preferably in person or failing that by proxy.

Minutes of the SGM held at the Hatfield Polytechnic, Hatfield, Herts, Sunday 22 Sept 1981.

The meeting was opened at 2.45 pm with Frank Kay, BASUG Chairman, in the chair. There were 29 members present in person and 40 proxies.

The Chairman explained that the meeting had been set up to enable BASUG to continue, since no subscription had been decided at the AGM. Item 1(a) on the Agenda was then discussed, namely:-

"That the annual subscription for 1982 be TEN POUNDS for renewing members, and TWELVE POUNDS FIFTY PENCE for new members."

Warren Avery suggested that, since the only difference between the £10 and £12.50 for new members was to get the Introductory disk, that a fee of £10 be charged for membership, but that £5 be added as a joining fee. There was much discussion over whether there ought to be a separate joining fee. It was pointed out that the new member would get a revamped introductory disk, but that it would not be substantially changed. The member joining for 1982 would only get issues of HARDCORE for that year, but could get back issues by paying for them. As to whether the amount was right, it was pointed out that the Committee had obviously discussed the matter and deemed it to be adequate. The Committee have discretionary powers regarding late joining subscriptions, and this had, been set at £6 for 1981 for those joining after 1 October, but this only entitled the receipt of issues 5 & 6 of HARDCORE, with the option to pay the full £10 and receive all back copies.

It was proposed and seconded to amend the motion to read:-

"The annual subscription for 1982 be £10and there shall be a one-time joining fee of £2.50."

The amendment to the motion having been carried unanimously, the amended motion was voted upon. The vote was unanimously for the motion.

In declaring the motion carried, the Chairman cast 27 proxies in favour of the motion.

Item 1(aii):-

"That all persons submitting subscriptions postmarked later than 31 JANUARY 1982 be deemed new members."

was discussed at some length. There were some objections as to its validity. Chester Kemp pointed out that the motion was unclear, all members subscriptions having lapsed on 31 December, all those joining in 1982 would be new members. The period was questioned, as was the difficulty in meeting January 31 for some people. It was pointed out that even if you paid the joining fee as well, you were only not paying £2.50 but getting a disk as well.

On a point of order Ian Trackman stated that it should be at the Committee's discretion to decide, since it would require an amendment to the constitution to define a new member.

A vote was taken that the motion not be put to the meeting. There were 26 for, 2 against, with 1 abstention.

The motion having been withdrawn, the views expressed were that it should be referred back to the Committee for decision.

Discussion took place as to whether there should be rolling membership. No decision was made; the Committee's view in previous discussion was that this is undesirable. It would require an amendment to the constitution.

The point of membership cards was also brought up, and the Committee stated their intention to bring them in.

Item 1(b) on the agenda was then discussed, namely:-

"That the committee take steps to establish a company intended to be known as 'BASUG LTD', subject to the approval of its constituting documentation at a further General meeting.

Richard Zawadzski pointed out that a limited company would have advantages such as being VAT registered, but that problems with directorships would arise.

Frank Kay said that the main reason the Committee had decided to go this way was to ease the burden of administration.

Bruce Snyder asked about shareholders, and Ian Trackman said it could be set up with Trustees to hold the shares on behalf of members of the club.

There then ensued a long discussion regarding the wording of the motion. The crux of the argument was whether the Committee should "take steps to establish" or whether they should investigate the establishment of a company and report back. Vernon Quaintance pointed out the company would involve heavy expense on legal documents to set it up, as well as expenses such as auditors fees. There would be a need to have two AGMs, one for BASUG and one for BASUG LTD. On the other hand it would be a means of reducing the liability of the committee. The local groups could take over a great deal of the administrative burden. He therefore suggested a vote against the motion.

The point about local groups was answered by John Sharp; it was difficult to getthem off the ground. Only the Raynes Park one was going, as a BASUG initiative. The group at Leicster was now affiliated, but had set themselves up as a group because they had seen BASUG as a ST Albans area group.

The motion was amended to read:-

"That the Committee take steps to investigate and produce a report for approval at a further general meeting, on the establishment of a vehicle to improve the future cost effectiveness and administrative efficiency of the management of the clubs affairs."

Item 2. Appointment of auditors.

There was discussion as to whether they should be outside the club or not, and it was pointed out that it would cost money if external auditors were employed.

The meeting gave the commmittee discretionary powers to appoint auditors for 1981, and as a first choice should chose from proffessional members within the club.

An appeal should go out through Hardcore.

The meeting closed at 4.30.

MACINTOSH NEWS:

Mac owners can now get their System and MacWrite / Paint disks updated from their dealers. The System Disk has a new Finder 1.1g which has, under the Special menu, the option to set an Application as a Start-up program. This means that on start-up the Mac goes directly into the selected program without first displaying the desktop, a great time saver. On the System Disk are some new fonts in the Fonts File. Los Angeles 12 and 24 point, New York 36 Point and Cairo which is a complete font of shapes.

Macpaint is now Version No. 1.3 with an extra print command so that now there is the choice between Print Draft and Print Final. Fill has been added to the EDIT menu. The Invert command can now be used with the Lasso. Macwrite Version 2.20 has _{sub} and ^{super}scripts, also the Format Menu has been improved (see next page). The Imagewriter print driver has been improved in the way that blank line space is handled especially on finishing a page.

MACINTOSH SOFTWARE LIBRARY DISKS:

The first two Mac disk are now available from the P.O.Box (£8.50 each). The first contains MacTEP, a telecommunications program in Microsoft Basic. There are also a number of MS Basic demo programs, and a Disk Dump. In the Macwrite Folder are extra notes describing the Quickdraw calls supported by Microsoft Basic but not clearly described in the manual.

The second disk has a version of LIFE, a program called Screen Maker to design your own start up screen, & Rolodex, all by Bill Atkinson (Macpaint author) and verious sound routines in MS Basic, including the Promenade from Pictures from an Exhibition by Moussorgsky.







No 10 is a FileVision Disk with a simple Graphic Adventure game done in FileVision - is this a novel use of a database? There is also a FileVision calendar file.







CORRECTION

In the last Update we did not make it clear that the D.A.M.P. does not run on the old Integer Apple II (unless you add a Language Card) because it is written in Applesoft Basic. Sorry to the member who bought it, however this led us to wonder who has the oldest Apple. So send in your serial numbers, and we will publish the results.

MACSTUFF

The upgrade to <code>MacWrite</code> which will allow for larger files is still not ready. Unofficial sources in the U.S. expect the final release to be Version 4.0. So far the latest version doing Beta testing is 3.8 and this is the lowest version that will work with <code>MacoSpelioRight</code> (a Spelling Checker from Assimilation Process). <code>MacTerminal</code> is finally due for release in early February although there is a UK version in the dealers for demo purposes. It works fine on the BBS and we have been using it successfully.

Microsoft have released the 2.0 version of Basic, and it is outstandingly better. You can now easily program your own Menu Bars and Dialog Boxes. There are two interpreters on the disk, a decimal version and a binary math version. Other enhancements include SOUND and WAVE commands and a PICTURE statement which allows a MacPaint Picture to be brought from the Clipboard into a program or vice versa. It can also be used to redraw an image in a window after it has been covered and then uncovered. The new version is at the same price as the old one and an upgrade is £50, for this you get a new disk and Manual.

MacSIG New Disks

There are three new disks in the Macintosh library and we must thank Washington Apple Pi for letting us use them.

816Mac12

This disk is especially for all you MacFORTH devotees. It includes a selection of games and utilities guaranteed to keep you loading FORTH screens for hours. With this disk and Creative Solutions MacFORTH language, you can play a game of backgammon, become fascinated with "Life", take MacForth apart, or disassemble your Macintosh. All with a flick of the old mouse. This disk is the first of what we hope will be many more FORTH only disks. For their help with this first disk, two WAP members should be thanked: Jim Russell, for providing a disk full of FORTH and other goodies, and Steve Hunt, both for programs and for the use of his MacFORTH disk. Of course, we also thank those who have given of their time and talent to create these programs and who have generously allowed us to use them.

Backgamman (by William F. Toleman, some corrections by Ward McFarland) This is an excellent version of the old family tavourite.

MacLIFE (by Ward McFarland) MacFORTH really shows its stuff in this program and it's the right stuff. Custom menus, user-defined windows, mouse control and all the things we thought we needed a Lisa to develop are here. While not as fast as Bill Atkinson's "Life" in SigMac Disk 2, it more than compensates by adding predefined patterns, pattern saving and reloading, and printing. The excellent documentation is an education in FORTH and in the concepts of "Life".

MacLife Doc Part I and II (by Ward McFarland) This documentation for MacLife is well worth reading whether you are interested in "Life" or in programming.

MacLife bibliography (by Ward McFarland) A list of recommended reading for programmers and "Life" enthusiasts.

MacMusic (by Ward McFarland) FORTH music that is most unusual. Foreshadows good things to come from FORTH.

Black Conversion Documentation (by John W. Baxter) This MacWrite Document describes the program **Convert** and **TOBLKS.BAS.** The programs will allow you to convert FORTH block files to text files and back. Useful for file transfer.

Convert (by John W. Baxter) This program provides a means of converting a MacFORTH block file to a format suitable for upload to systems such as CompuServe^{TN} and the Source^{TN}. It also provides a method for reconversion of downloaded files.

DECOMP.4TH (by Alan D. Galumbeck) Decomp decompiles the definition of the next word in the input stream. A line is displayed for each word in the definition.

DEFINE.4TH (by Wayne R. Loofbourrow) This is another FORTH decompiler. This program allows one to see the definition of an already compiled word without access to the source code.

DISK_COPY (by Ward J McFarland) This is a FORTH program to copy disks or examine selected disk sectors. The program has a few bugs.

FORTH.XMT (by William Bond) This is a prototype file transmission scheme for the Macintosh. It will take a MacFORTH block file and convert it to a format sultable for transmission over a modern to another computer.

Forth Bug Notes This MacWrite document identifies two small bugs in MacFORTH and what to do about them.

TOBLKS.BAS (by John W. Baxter) This MS-BASIC program reads a formatted text file, and produces the equivalent MacFORTH Blocks file. For information about the format of the file see the remarks in the program listing.

TUBE (by William Bond) This is the MacFORTH Online Terminal Emulator with enhancements to the original by William Bond.

DSML 10.4th (by N. Lebedin)This program will display the contents of any address or range of addresses in the Mac as assembler instructions. It adds a new word to your MacFORTH vocabulary. The word is DSM. To compile it, double click in the MacFORTH language icon. At the ok prompt, type: INCLUDE "DSML 10.4th" followed by a return. The disassembler will load and you can start disassembling all 500 or so of the MacRom routines.

DSML 10.bin (by N. Lebedin)This is a binary file used by the disassembler. It is assumed to be on the same disk as FORTH. If not, DSML 10.4th will fail to load correctly.

SigMAC 13

Contains MacKermit – a Communications program an adaptation of Colombia's Unix kermit. It has only been tested with that version of kermit – Some Fonts – 2 Games (lago, a version of Othello and Bricks) and amongst other Items FILE, a useful Editor for straight Text work with multiple windows and FileEdit – a very powerful Utility for editing any sector on a disk but BE CAREFUL only use backups!!

SigMAC 14

Contains MS Basic Programs – A new version of MacTEP called **AutoTEP** (by Ralph L. Miller, Dennis Brothers, and Lofty Becker) Auto TEP is based on Dennis Brothers' MacTEP version 1.87. It has all the features of that program, and corrects some errors (such as buffer overflow when printing at 1200 baud). It also incorporates the menus which Lofty Becker created for MacTEP version 1.81, and updates them to the 1.87 version. It uses overlays so that desk accessories can be used with the program, and no special CLEAR instructions are needed. It adds certain menu features, such as clickable user selection of XON/XOFF and modem hangup. It also has clickable control of scrolling.

Also on the disk are:- A number of games - Cattalogger to maintain a disk based catalog of all your disks. An interesting program is RADAR.BAS which is for downloading the current US weather map from CompuserveTM. There is a sample of a weather map included on the disk.

These 3 disks are now available from the office at the normal price of £8.50 each.

LaserBase

This interesting new database is written by Nigel Parry and Nigel Hearne, who both used to work for Apple UK, and have been immersed in Macology long before the machine was launched on the public. Since the brochures were printed they have added some extra features as a result of comments collected at Which Computer Show. You can print out reports in the Macs High Resolution Fonts (only one font is allowed at any time but this is in line with Typesetting design criteria) You can communicate with Macwrite etc and add Macpaint designed Logo's or Graphics. Other Macnews

• Rumours from the Mouse Hole in the U.S. talk of a 1 meg upgrade board from Cupertino as well as a possible 10 meg drive in the box. Less of a rumour is the news of the Finder which is now (mid March) at Version 2.7x but this still has some bugs to be ironed out but is expected to be released with a general upgrade in April. The Application Switcher will also be ready by then, pre-release versions are about now and they really have to be seen to be believed. The Switcher allows a Fat Mac to be divided into 4 128k segments so that you can have 4 applications in Ram at once (but only use one at a time, the others are frozen), just hit \$8\$ and its there!

- An Interesting attribute of the RamDisk application is that you can get upto about 750k of RamDisk on a Imag Lisa (oops sorry Macintosh XL) and have the Hard disk as well.... Hmmm...
- OverVUE This database has been improved the first version had some faults like:- 1) you couldn't put more information in one record than could be seen at one time on the screen; 2) OverYUE didn't support joins to info in other files; 3) you couldn't load info from other types of databases or text files; 4) once printing started it couldn't be stopped; 5) you couldn't print to a file. Well, the author has listened to all the crits and has come up with a solution which corrects all this AND adds some FAB new ideas and features. The disk 1/0 speed is now vastly improved. The demo file of 400 records used to take 35 seconds to load now takes 5. He has solved (1) by introducing a Zoom. (2) Relational functions now provided (3) You can now import DIF, SYLK or Text files and Standard Text files can be separated by spaces, commas or carriage returns. He has added a charting facility. All this is available in April and upgrades in the US are \$20 to existing Users New buyers ask for Yersion 2.0.
- The following two messages came from The Mouse Hole which is a BBS in the States for Mac Folks but there is some Apple][stuff on it as well - Have not got the number at the moment.

 I have been using a review copy of Think Tank 512 for about 3 weeks now and I have nothing but nice as to say about it. It operates very quickly and now includes a built in text editor that you can open in windows beneath any outline entry. It also enables you to import graphics files through the scrapbook to store in the outline. (A sample file on the program disk was a Living Videotext's planning outline for Comdex--it included a MacPaint floorplan of their booth showing placement of computers, salespeople, etc.) Although ThinkTank's word processor does not use the Rom-based Mac editor never-the-less it works well. It fully supports the cursor keys on the keypad (as, by the way, do most of the Microsoft packages, incl Word), and includes command-key shortcuts for Page-Up, Page-Down, Home, and most other cursor-movement commands for keyboard-dependent text editors. The icing on the cake is the Think Tank print-out. You can boldface headlines to any level, include hierarchical numbering, and Think Tank will automatically create page headers, footers, and a table of contents. I also been using File for a week or two. (I should be getting Word within a couple days.) Well, the file manager seems to have come of age for the Macintosh. File is not relational, but it can handle very large sets of data in single files. It makes creating forms a snap, and you can toogle back and forth between two views of your data (expanded and condensed) with a keystroke. It can index any number of fields within a record, and finds and sorts happen quit fast for a disk-based data managt has the most intuitive guery method I have yet seen: You are presented with a copy of you data-entry form and simply type into the fields the sort criteria. By doing this you can simultaneously sort on multiple fields (LastName>Johnson; Sales>50,000). By the way, most of you may already know that Microsoft will be bundling their four applications as the BusinessPack for \$595, not \$395 as I erroneously reported a week or two ago. My apologies. G.V.

 About the best way I know of to do screen graphics in BASIC is to set up a custom library of routines that you can use in each program you create. If standardize on a set of coordinate variables (such as Left, Right, Top, etc.) you can use them when calling the same generic routines from within your code. I learned from experience that typical buttons look good about 60 pixels wide and no more than 20 pixels deep (of course, these measurements should be whatever YOU decide is most appropriate.) I have a button routine wich displays a button with these dimensions with the variable contents Button\$ using coordinates Left and Top. Left and are usually offsets of a constant such as Indent or TopWindow. It is a simple matter to format a window outured all in offsets by calling generic subroutines. It is also a snap to change the location of a single button or a whole group of buttons by altering the value of the variables. Admittedly, this approach won't work in all cases, but it works well most of the time. Another technique I sometimes use for quick and dirty formatting is to type a statement in the Command window to executin the immediate mode. If you copy your statement into the clipboard, you can execute it, see the results, paste it, make changes, execute it again, etc... When you get the look you want you can paste the corrected graphics statement into the program I've noticed that using the Mac ROM routines saves guite a bit of time over using the BASIC statements LINE and CIRCLE. When looping through a complex graphics routine, the ROM calls can speed things up a good deal. However, you'll have to use subscripted variables in your calls to define the boundaries of the shapes. In addition, the syntax for defining shape boundaries is different in BASIC than in the Mac ROM calls, i.e.:-

LINE (Left,Top)-(Right,Bottom),,b draws the same rectangle as....CALL FRAMERECT(VARPTR(Rect%(0))) where Rect%(0) through Rect%(3) are equal to Top, Left, Bottom and Right.

This reversal of order between the coordinates can cause a headache when mixing the two graphics statements in the same program. I know none of this advice will take the place of a good utility, but I use graphics in a lot of my programs, and I can now write a screen output routine in about half the time this way. Food for thought.





For those of us who are using The Force please read and clear your mail regularly to keep your charges down. For those using ASCII Pro to talk to the Force the following Logon Macro works a treat.

"D1"{NUI?}NTL60LD901TYM'{ADD?}A21920100484'{0N}ID BSG***' \$:pswd

Ascii Pro uses ' (single quote) as a carriage return symbol. Don't type a carriage return - type the single quote. The program normally uses < & > as delimiters to "wait for this string" but I changed these in the Configuration so as not to conflict with The Force's > prompt. It does nopt affect this Macro but later on I may use other Macros. So if you use it as it comes out of the box substitute $\{\}$ for <>.

Another useful Macro (have your COPY BUFFER ON on startup) is:-

MAIL RE DALL ' { items? }Y"

This will read all your mail and delete it - this is why you must make sure you have the Copy buffer-on. It is possible to Turn Buffer ON in a Macro but I prefer to have it on on startup and then edit out the unnecessary bits later off line. Using Macros saves time and time = money.

Macintosh

By the time this reaches you, Apple should begin to distribute the New Finder 4.1, MacWrite 4.5, MacPaint 1.5, a New Imagewriter Driver and a new Font and Desk Accessory Mover in the U.K. Included in the US upgrade is an application called System Update. Run this and it prompts you to insert your application disks and then automatically it installs the Finder, updates the System File and installs the new Imagewriter driver. The Finder is greatly improved and has the option of a MiniFinder which makes moving from program to program much easier. The Font/Desk Accessory Mover is a delightfully useful utility, making the changing of Fonts much quicker and easier than the first version. You will still need the Old independent DA Mover to install any Accessories with the Diamond Icon.

General News

Apple have announced that they are to produce a 20meg personal Hard disk for the Mac. It will sit under the Mac with the same foot print and be about 1.5/2 inches high - don't expect this till the autumn. At around the same time some of the operating system will go into ROM - this has been rumoured for some time but it looks for real now. Coming back to the present, MacDraw has at last arrived and Version 1.7 is available now in the UK for sale.

One of the committee attended Softsel's Softeach and found some interesting Apple items shown in an IBM dominated show. Megahaus have introduced Megaform. This program lets you create any form on the Mac and it is not just a pretty picture but can be a live form with Database/Speadsheet powers. Can we forsee a new vertical market in electronic forms. Just think - design your own form for invoices add the lookup table to calculate the vat/discount, add reference to mailing list, enter the data for the transactions and

then either print it out print it out or send it via E-Mail to you client. Megahaus tell us that Apple at Cupertino are using this for their forms now. It is possible to complete one of their dealer forms from a dealers office and return it completed without even printing it out by using the Mac and MacTerminal.

For the Apple//e or //c and Macintosh, Mouse Systems showed an electronic Mouse with no moving parts except the switch. It runs on a 9 x 7.75" Plate of Aluminium which is covered with grid lines and a silicon top surface. It is very smooth in action and for someone who is doing a lot of CAD work it is a superior feel to the standard Apple mouse but at \$99 its not cheap. They also make one for the IBM which comes complete with drivers to add window menu's for 1.2.3, Wordstar and many other popular programs.

PFS gave us a demo of *PFS Write* for the Apple//. If anyone wants a try send in a 5.25" disk with SAE to Peter Trinder.

Did you see the Thunderscan[™] on Tomorrows World? P&P were swamped with orders next day! Radio 4 had Douglas Adams playing Hitch Hickers on the Mac – you could hear the Sony dirge and the clatter of a Mac keyboard!



Modern unable TO dial?

IF you find that you cannot auto-dial through your terminal software using a built in dialing option then it is probably caused by your terminal not being set-up for 8# data bits and no parity.

Macintosh Jazz users will often come across this problem since Jazz defaults to 7# data bits and no parity. Just go and change the configuration in Jazz to 8# data bits and no parity.

Jazz users may also have trouble using bulletin boards which accept Control-D. Control-S and so on - these result in unwanted things happening like files being saved etc - simply use the Shift key as well! Another tip is that you can send text simply by 'Pasting' in clippings from an adjacent Word Proc File - it whizzes straight out through the modem!



Shrinking MacPaint lan McKinnell

MacPaint can be made over 13k smaller. By using Redit, Resource mover or (preferably) Resource editor, the two PICTS 'Introduction' and 'shortcuts' can be removed. The program won't crash if these items are subsequently selected from the menu, but it's neater to remove them first, using menuedit (introduction will need to be unenabled first)
